Our entire focus in August was to extend free vaccination drive to the villages and tea gardens where people were unable to access vaccines to protect themselves from Covid-19. To a large extent we were able to reach the intended target groups, with the vaccination of 1375 people with our own resources. Another 840 persons were given the first dose with the help of the Health Department, Darjeeling.

In August there were 3 Covid patients (all nurses from the nearby government medical college) in our Safe Home, Matigara. They got themselves discharged after about two weeks, when they tested negative. Right now there is only one patient, above 60 years old.

The next logical step is to plan for the second dose for those who were administered the first jab through our outreach programmes. Now that more government sponsored jabs are beginning to be available, we are trying to explore other avenues where our resources can be better utilised in terms of Covid assistance.

In West Bengal, September is a month to watch as people are beginning to crowd to register themselves to avail the state government's various welfare schemes. The biggest Bengal festival, Puja, is just around the corner (mid October). Still a large section of the population isn't vaccinated even with the first dose. We are yet to receive any vaccine for children (below 18 years).

We'll reach out to the people the best way possible in the months ahead. Your suggestions are most welcome.

VACCINATION CAMP AT GAYAGANGA

In response to the Covid – 19 pandemic, Fr Peter Pappu SJ, with the help of Jesuit Community, Catholic Sabha Members, the teachers of St Peter's Primary School and a few nurses from Navjeevan Hospital, organized the camp on 24th August 2021 (Tuesday)at St Peter's Church, Gayaganga for 264 poor people hailing from surrounding tea gardens under the guidance of Fr Lawrence Thanislaus SJ, member of the Emergency Response Team. The beneficiaries were chosen based on their economical conditions irrespective of caste,creed and color. Covishield first dose was administered to all. The purpose of the camp was twofold:to serve the poor and to protect them from any health hazards.The vaccine was administered by Medica North Bengal Clinic, Siliguri as per the Covid-19 guidelines. The camp was sponsored fully by the Darjeeling Jesuits of North Bengal with the help of generous donors.Organizing the vaccination camp is one of the many ways the Darjeeling Jesuits offer their relentless service to the tea workers. VACCINATION CAMP AT LOYOLA HIGH SCHOOL, KELABARI

A vaccination Camp was held at Loyola School, Uttar Salbari (Kelabari) on 28th of August, 2021, sponsored by Darjeeling Jesuits of North Bengal.

The camp was organized here for two reasons:

1.To make vaccination available to a large number of people who went to many places with the hope of getting vaccinated but due to non-availability of vaccines, returned home, after waiting and wasting the whole day in a long queue. Many elderly and the poor people are deprived of vaccination in this area.

2.To bring awareness about safety from Covid-19. Quite a large number of people are still afraid and have misconception about Corona Virus and vaccination.

With the help of the Jesuit community at Loyola Niwas, and some volunteers from among the school staff of Loyola High School, a list of 352 potential beneficiaries was made. Their names were registered with the government portal (www.cowin.com.registration). Input about safety from Covid-19 was given to them.

With the help of staff of Medica North Bengal Clinic, Siliguri, the Vaccination camp was held on the 28th of from 9.30 am to 4.00 pm. Eleven persons who were not registered also came and waited for a long time with the hope of getting vaccinated. Among them was a differently-abled person on a wheel-chair, a few elderly persons, and some construction labourers. They were all vaccinated with extra payment made. Hence, altogether 363 people were vaccinated.







Those who came for vaccination were very happy with the well-organised and systematic way the camp was conducted. They were glad that the camp was held close to their homes.They did not have to wait for long in the queue. The differently abled person, Mr Depchander Oraon said " I am happy to be vaccinated here. I didn't have to go too far pulling my wheelchair, waiting for long in the queue to be vaccinated".

The local people and the media were all in praise of this humanitarian help funded by the donors of the Darjeeling Jesuits, when a large section of the population, especially the poor,still struggle to get this much needed protective vaccine.

St Vincent's High School at Gayaganga near Bagdogra in Siliguri organised a free Covid-19 vaccination camp for tea garden workers yesterday, where a total of 264 individ-uals were given their first Covishield shots. According to Fr Lawrence Thanislaus, the Headmaster

of the school, he organised the much-needed camp at St Peter's Church, Gayaganga, on behalf of the Darjeeling

Jesuits of North Bengal. "The camp was fully spon-sored by the Darjeeling Jesuits of North Bengal and it was solely for the poor tea garden people, who cannot afford to have paid vaccine. By this vaccination drive, we wanted to show our solidarity with the people and to reach out to many," Fr Thanislaus said.



According to him, Dar-jeeling Jesuits are serving the people irrespective of caste, creed and colour in the entire region of North Bengal. St Peter's Church is known for serving poor teagarden work-ers. "FrPeter Pappu SJ, the present Pastor of the Church, along with his community members, works tirelessly to empower the powerless," Fr Thanislaus said. "The Jesuits are at the ser-

vice of others, searching 'Magis' (Latin word) mean-ing 'more' or 'greater' in all that we do and work for the greater glory of our Creator. The free vaccination camp sponsored completely by the Darjeeling Jesuits of North Bengal was one such example to reach out to humani-ty. The beneficiaries were chosen on the basis of their economic condition in their families during this pan-demic," he added. Medica North Bengal Clin-

"In the future, if there is a great need for the second dose, the parent body will once again try to organise another free camp," he added.
